Blocking Neonics

With growing evidence of risks to wildlife, Health Canada has proposed to ban imidacloprid, one of the systemic pesticides known as neonicotinoids.

"These pesticides seep into streams and lakes from farmers' fields and kill aquatic insects, many of which are a very important food source for fish and birds," said Carolyn Callaghan, senior conservation biologist with the Canadian Wildlife Federation.

Health Canada's risk-management plan includes a proposed three- to five-year phase-out of imidacloprid.

"This is a big step in the right direction," Callaghan said. "Imidacloprid is one of the most widely used pesticides and has been found in aquatic environments in Canada up to 290 times the acceptable level for aquatic invertebrates."

There are eight other neonicotinoid pesticides in use, however, and CWF continues to raise concerns about their impacts on biodiversity, including a policy adopted by our board of directors that will guide our organization on urging governments to take action.

While protection of the environment is paramount, CWF also wants assurance that our farmers are supported throughout the banning process.

WHAT DOES HINTERLAND WHO'S WHO HOPE TO ACHIEVE WITH ITS SPECIAL 150TH ACTIVITIES?

Hinterland has always been a vehicle for connecting humans with their wild neighbours and surrounding wild spaces, and that's not going to change. This coming year, we will be adding a historical focus to our PSAs, as we all look back on the history of our beautiful land, and we'll be providing people with a chance to connect with live wildlife ambassadors at special events too. We don't just want to look back at the past 150 years, though; we want to encourage Canadians to continue to appreciate and conserve all that is wild into the future.

WHAT ABOUT YOU? DO YOU PERSONALLY HAVE ANYTHING SPECIAL PLANNED TO HELP CELEBRATE CANADA'S 150TH?

My connection with nature has always been a huge part of my life, but I think the 150th has given me a chance to pause and think about where Canada has been and where it will be. Wildlife has always been interwoven with the original inhabitants of this land, and wildlife brought many new people to this land. I want to celebrate what has been learned and what is still left to be discovered. I'll probably spend some more time this year thinking about our country's wild history through the work I do with *Hinterland Who's Who*, the events I will attend and the fellow Canadians I will share stories with... and I will for sure be spending as much time as possible in the wild.
